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Walton Heath Golf Club

Walton Heath's Old Course has staged more than 60 major amateur and professional championships, the most famous of which was the 1981 Ryder Cup. Founded in 1903, the club opened its first course in May 1904. The neighbouring New Course, despite its name, opened as early as 1907. Walton Heath's history is further enriched by the legendary "Great Triumvirate of Vardon, Taylor, and Braid, who inaugurated the club with an exhibition match.



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Hindhead Golf Club

Founded in 1904 by a group of local enthusiasts—including Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, who served as the club's first president—Hindhead Golf Club is one of England's most celebrated heathland courses. Originally 12 holes and later extended to 18 by five-time Open Champion J.H. Taylor, the course was officially opened in 1907 with a challenge match between James Braid and Taylor, won by Braid.



The Berkshire Golf Club

Founded in 1928, The Berkshire Golf Club is home to two Herbert Fowler-designed heathland masterpieces: the Red and the Blue. Set amid towering pines, sweeping heather, and sandy terrain, both courses reflect Fowler's gift for working with the land to create strategic, visually captivating golf.



Worplesdon Golf Club

Founded in 1908, Worplesdon Golf Club is one of Surrey's distinguished heathland gems and part of the famed "Three Ws" with Woking and West Hill.

Designed by J.F. Abercromby, with greens and bunkers by Willie Park Jr., its just-under-6,500-yard, par-71 layout winds through towering pines and vivid heather for a strategic yet inviting challenge
